The kingdom of God was the major theme of Jesus' ministry and His favorite description of what God is doing in the world. Jesus often began His parables by saying, "The kingdom of God is like . . ." In fact, the word kingdom is used more than 150 times in the New Testament.

What is the gospel message? In recent decades, the popular meaning of Jesus' birth, life, death, and teaching has been pared down to two mutually exclusive shreds. The first is that Jesus came to save you from the punishment for sin in the fires of hell, which he accomplished by his death.

The second is that Jesus came to teach you how to end human evil and bring about heaven on earth through the overhaul of social systems. What they have in common is a single-minded focus on human evil and sin and what Jesus has done about them. Dallas calls this focus the gospel of sin management.

In contrast, he presents the gospel of Jesus (or gospel of the kingdom). This is the idea that Jesus' purpose is to proclaim the current availability of life in the kingdom of God. Life in the kingdom of God is not an after-death experience only, and it is not brought about by humans focused on solving social ills. Life in the kingdom of God is brought about by an individual having confidence in the truth that Jesus is all he says he is, following his way, and living an interactive, power-filled, intimate life with God now. This gospel is taught throughout the New Testament, but fleshed out in Matthew 5 through 7. In emphasizing the gospel of the kingdom Dallas was not denying that justification came through Christ's death of the cross. He was expanding

beyond the overly simplistic concern about getting into heaven, and suggesting there is more to salvation than justification. Neither was he suggesting that the improvement of life for the poor and the oppressed doesn't matter, or that wrongs shouldn't be righted. He was stating that changing the systems doesn't change the people, but transformed people cannot help but effect change by their very presence in the world.


